

# UPSIDE DOWN **DOWN UNDER**

Down Under, 'July doesn't mean summer and there's no such thing as a white Christmas! Here, the best things to do when it's hot, cold and everything in between.



Summer DEC - JAN - FEB When it's winter in the Northern Hemisphere, Australia is making the most of its summer. A government approved 'changing of the clocks' (they go forward an



hour in summer, except in Queensland) means that the days are extra-long and the whole country is in a great mood. Summer temperatures hover between 82°F and 96°F so it's a good time to head to the beach: Sydney's BONDI is the most famous; in Perth head to **SCARBOROUGH** and COTTESLOE; BURLEIGH HEADS on the Gold Coast; and MOOLOOLABA Main Beach on the Sunshine Coast.



Fall MAR - APR - MAY

Summer fades into fall slowly, with the early months boasting pleasantly mild temperatures between 58°F and 72°F. This is prime food festival time in Australia, with NOOSA FOOD + WINE taking place in Queensland, TASTING AUSTRALIA happening in and around Adelaide, MELBOURNE FOOD & WINE FESTIVAL creating a buzz, and ORANGE F.O.O.D **WEEK** in the regional New South Wales town of Orange. Or, if you prefer festivals to serve up art instead of food, check out the world-

renowned **ADELAIDE FESTIVAL** 

and **ADELAIDE FRINGE**.

snow can be found in places like the **VICTORIAN HIGH** COUNTRY in Victoria and the SNOWY MOUNTAINS in New South Wales; meanwhile, up north, in places like the Northern Territory, Western Australia and Tropical North of Queensland, slightly cooler temperatures make it the perfect time to visit attractions like **ULURU**, BROOME, THE KIMBERLEY and CAIRNS. In TASMANIA, indulge in coastal walking tours and moody scenery.




JUN - JUL - AUG The winter months present a best of both worlds proposition in Australia. There's a chill in the air and





<u>Spring</u> SEP - OCT - NOV

There's a sense of excitement in the air when spring arrives: the days start getting warmer and the country bursts into color. Now's the time to head to Western Australia for WILDFLOWER season, where some 12,000 species are on display during October and November. In New South Wales, the North Coast city of **GRAFTON** is painted a beautiful shade of purple when its jacaranda trees bloom. And in Canberra FLORIADE is a month-long celebration of spring with cultural events, food and wine, and abundant blooms.





## PLANNING THE ULTIMATE AUSSIE GETAWAY

Whether you have 10 days or 20 (or more), there's plenty to see and do Down Under.



#### SEE THE CITIES

**SYDNEY** makes for a great introduction to AUSTRALIA. Beyond the beautiful **SYDNEY HARBOUR** – home to the **SYDNEY** HARBOUR BRIDGE and SYDNEY OPERA **HOUSE** – the city boasts some of the world's best beaches, coastal walks, well-appointed museums and a thriving food and wine scene. Day trips to the magnificent slate-colored cliffs, canyons and waterfalls of the **BLUE MOUNTAINS** to Sydney's west, or the secluded beaches and rainforests of the **ROYAL NATIONAL PARK** to the city's south, are both easily achieved in your first week. From here, fly to MELBOURNE – Australia's other mecca on the east coast - which offers up **ART-FILLED ALLEYWAYS**, legendary **SPORTS** events, trendy neighborhoods

> and a cornucopia of world-class cafes and bars. Spend a night or two in the **MORNINGTON PENINSULA** to relax on its sparkling beaches, dine on the abundant local produce and unwind in luxe boutique accommodation.

#### IF YOU HAVE 10 DAYS OR MORE

MARVEL AT THE ICONS For a delightful contrast of rainforest and reef with red earth and rock, start at the GREAT BARRIER REEF and finish at **ULURU**. Spanning a staggering 1430 miles along the east coast, and home to 2900 individual reefs, 300 coral cays and 600 continental islands, the GREAT


**BARRIER REEF** (Earth's largest living thing) is deserving of its UNESCO World Heritage listing, and offers visitors myriad possibilities

to swim, snorkel, dive and sail. You can access the reef from BRISBANE via COOKTOWN in FAR NORTH QUEENSLAND, the mainland gateways of CAIRNS and PORT DOUGLAS, TOWNSVILLE, any of the pristine Whitsunday

Islands, or via BUNDABERG and the surrounding islands in the Southern Great Barrier Reef. Bookend your trip with a stopover in **BRISBANE** and the nearby GOLD COAST. A three-hour flight from Brisbane is all it takes to get to Australia's other most important natural landmark, ULURU. So immense,



deeply spiritual and eerily still is this red rock monolith that little can be said to match its significance. Nearby KATA TJUTA (The Olgas) and KINGS CANYON



are just as spellbinding. End your outback sojourn with a few nights in ALICE **SPRINGS**, where mountain ranges, clear night skies and freshwater swimming holes are the entertainment.



#### IF YOU HAVE 20 DAYS OR MORE



#### GO FROM TOP то воттом For a mix of lush

rainforests, islands and reefs, white-sand beaches, coastal towns and cosmopolitan cities, stick to



Australia's east coast. Start in CAIRNS or the WHITSUNDAYS before making your way down to BRISBANE, the GOLD COAST and bohemian BYRON BAY. It takes roughly 90 minutes to fly direct from Byron Bay to Sydney, where more pristine beaches and Aussie landmarks await. From here, jet to MELBOURNE and wander the city's bustling laneways for all things trendy and tasty, but keep a few days free to explore the MORNINGTON PENINSULA (one hour out of Melbourne) and WILSONS PROMONTORY (three hours out of Melbourne), or join a tour of one of the world's most scenic coastal drives along the **GREAT OCEAN** ROAD. Finish up your vacation in HOBART, the capital of the state of TASMANIA - less than one hour by plane from MELBOURNE where countless natural wonders and epic walks are within reach.

#### CROSS FROM EAST TO WEST

Start in SYDNEY, then zigzag your way south west to ADELAIDE, up to ULURU and ALICE SPRINGS, onwards north to **DARWIN** and across to **PERTH** for a marathon all-of-Australia itinerary. ADELAIDE, with its heritage architecture, sophisticated dining and burgeoning smallbar scene, will be your last taste of city life before you venture into Australia's **RED CENTRE** and spiritual heart. Crocodile encounters, balmy nights and adventures

into the fern-fringed swimming holes, wetlands and waterfalls of nearby KAKADU and LITCHFIELD NATIONAL PARKS are accessible from DARWIN. before a quick airplane jaunt west puts you in PERTH. Life unfolds at a comfortable pace here, making it a relaxing end to an ambitious schedule.



#### IF YOU HAVE MORE TIME

Lucky you; the LAND DOWN UNDER has plenty more in store for visitors with extra time. From **SYDNEY**, travel two hours by air to spend a few days at World Heritage-listed LORD HOWE ISLAND - a natural paradise packed with adventures in and out of the water. Boasting more than 150 wineries and 50 cellar doors, taste some of the most awarded wines in the world and sample some of the region's best local produce in the BAROSSA VALLEY near ADELAIDE. From



PERTH, fly to EXMOUTH - the gateway to nearby NINGALOO **REEF** – to swim with gentle and elusive whale sharks.





### A GUIDE TO **AUSSIE ENGLISH**

Here are some useful words and phrases to help you navigate Australia's unique take on the English language.



G'DAY: A popular form of greeting; an abbreviation of "good day" used in place of "hello"

MATE: The mystique and meaning of 'mate' to Australians is enormous; it's used to refer to friends and strangers alike and implies a level of friendship, inclusion and egalitarianism that goes to the heart of the Australian culture and national identity

TA AND CHEERS: Both mean "thank you"

**NO WORRIES:** A general response to being thanked; "no problem" is also popularly used

GONE WALKABOUT: Used figuratively when someone or something can't be found, or literally when someone heads into the bush without a set return date

FAIR DINKUM: Genuine, honest or authentic; "That's fair dinkum amazing"

or "Are you fair dinkum?" **ARVO:** Afternoon, as in "See you this arvo"

YEAH, NAH: Also heard as "yeah, but" this translates to "I understand what you are saying but I don't necessarily agree with it''

**RIGHTO:** Delivery is key here; it can mean "OK", "Right, let's get going" or "I understand, but I'm not sure I believe you"

**SHE'LL BE RIGHT:** Everything is OK GOOD ONYA: Congratulations given on doing something well

CRIKEY OR STREWTH: Translates to "Oh my goodness" or "wow" YOU LITTLE RIPPER: That's fantastic **HEAPS GOOD:** Used when something is excellent

GALAH: A derrogatory remark for someone behaving foolishly, as in "stop acting like a flamin' galah"

#### THE LANGUAGE OF THE BARBEQUE

It would be a mistake to underestimate the role that the barbeque plays in Australian society. Unlike the Texan barbeque - involving wood, charcoal, spicy



rubs and large hunks of meat, the traditional Aussie barbeque is a little more all-encompassing, referring to the grilling of any kind of meat over a flame. Known locally as the "barbie" (pronounced "baaarbie"), as in "throw another shrimp on the barbie", the word is used



not only to describe the appliance itself but also the social gathering that results from it. If you're invited to "come over for a barbie", you'll be offered a choice of snags

(sausages), prawns (shrimp), yabbies (freshwater crawfish), burgers, chops


(a cut of lamb) and steak; modern offerings influenced by Australia's multicultural society include kebabs, aromatic marinated chicken, stir fry and even pizza. Australians also utilize the

barbie to raise money for charity. Known as a "sausage sizzle", the traditional offering is a snag on a folded slice of white bread with a generous slug of tomato sauce (ketchup), although flaky bread

rolls and fried onions on top are also popular. The best place to find a sausage sizzle in Australia is at popular hardware store Bunnings Warehouse.



# HOW LONG WILL IT TAKE ME?

Flying from the United States to Australia is possible from various cities and with a range of airlines including Qantas, Delta, United Airlines, Virgin Australia and American Airlines. The popular route from Los Angeles to Sydney takes 15 hours direct and just shy of 16 hours to Melbourne; New York to Sydney clocks in at around 22 hours and roughly 24 hours to Melbourne. Dallas to Sydney takes 17 hours, while Houston to Melbourne is

**SYDNEY:** Sydney is serviced by numerous domestic airlines, and you can get just about anywhere by plane: Brisbane or Melbourne are a short 1.5-hour flight away, and Perth is just over four hours' flying time. Getting to popular regional hubs like laidback 'Newy' (Newcastle) and boho Byron Bay (via Ballina Airport) is also easy from Sydney. **MELBOURNE:** Melbourne to Brisbane takes about 2.5 hours, Perth takes about 3.5 hours, and there are regular 1.5-hour flights throughout the day to Sydney. HOBART: While the Tasmanian capital is not serviced by international flights, there are daily flights into Hobart from Sydney (roughly two hours) and Melbourne (just over an hour), as well as flights from Brisbane and Adelaide. **ADELAIDE:** Adelaide Airport receives some

international flights as well as daily direct domestic flights from every capital city. Sydney takes just over two hours while Perth is roughly three hours away. **PERTH:** There are direct flights to Perth from every capital city in Australia. It takes about 5.5 hours from Brisbane or 3.5 hours from Darwin. **DARWIN:** Direct flights to Darwin are

available from Sydney, Melbourne, Brisbane, Perth, and Adelaide, From Melbourne it takes about 4.5 hours, Perth takes 3.5 hours and Sydney takes 4.5 hours. **BRISBANE:** Fly into Brisbane's International Airport direct or take a short flight from any capital city; from Adelaide it's 2.5 hours and Hobart is just short of three hours away. THE GREAT BARRIER REEF: Cairns, Townsville, Airlie Beach (Proserpine) and

20.5 hours. From Honolulu to Sydney, the direct flight will get you there in 10 hours. Once in Australia there are frequent flights between the capital cities of each state via domestic carriers such as Qantas, Virgin Australia and Jetstar, as well as to regional centers on the likes of Rex Airlines and QantasLink. Before booking and/or departure, make sure to check visa and entry requirements, and travel updates at *australia.com* 

> Hamilton Island are all gateways to the reef, with flights available from many capital cities. Flying from Sydney to Cairns takes about three hours, while Perth to Cairns takes roughly six hours.

> THE RED CENTRE: Fly to Alice Springs from most Australian capitals; it takes just over three hours from Sydney and just under from Melbourne. You can fly direct to Ayers Rock Airport to see Australia's most iconic monolith, Uluru, from Sydney (3.5 hours) and Melbourne (three hours).

**CANBERRA:** There are flights to Canberra from many capital cities including Sydney, Melbourne, Brisbane, Adelaide and Perth. From Sydney and Melbourne the journey takes just over an hour, while flights from Perth take just under four hours. 🔕

# HAPPY GLAMP

amping isn't for everyone. The equipment hauling, the uncertain weather, the questionable ✓ (or absence of) bathroom facilities. Nature, on the other hand, is a real crowd pleaser. If only there was a way to enjoy camping's many wonders without all its pitfalls. All hail the rise of glamping. The glamorous/ camping amalgam has taken off in Australia and shows no signs of waning as new and unique variations of the trend continue to pop up in bustling cities, in sweeping bushland, on sandy shores - anywhere there's room to pitch an (admittedly larger than average) tent. Here, some of Australia's top glamping options.

#### SANCTUARY BY SIRROMET

One sip at Sirromet's tasting room and you won't want to leave. And fortunately, you don't have to. Less than 40 minutes from Brisbane, Sirromet offers 18 luxury safari-style tents, allowing guests to linger a little longer among the grand paperbarks and scribbly gums. Each tent boasts contemporary furnishings, private bathrooms and air conditioning, and a balcony where guests can mingle with the resident wildlife. The modern Australian cuisine at its restaurant, Lurleen's, won't disappoint either.

#### PEBBLE POINT

Set behind the geological marvel that is the 12 Apostles on the Great Ocean Road in Victoria, just over three hours from the heart of Melbourne, Pebble Point is truly bush meets beach. Located within a few feet of three national parks, Pebble Point's six safari tents put nature front and center. Amazing walking trails, migrating southern right whales and secluded beaches await, as do those craggy limestone stacks – numbering seven rather than 12 these days due to erosion, but still a truly dramatic sight.

#### ROAR AND SNORE

Forget a room with a view; this is a room with a zoo. Roar and Snore is Taronga Zoo Sydney's own unique glamping experience. Safari-style accommodation comes with a glamorous backdrop of Sydney's famous harbor, but what's really wild about Taronga's overnight offering is the permanent residents. Intimate animal encounters and an exclusive night safari are all part of the experience before guests turn in for the evening, to be lulled to sleep by a wildlife serenade.

#### PAPERBARK CAMP

For glamping fans, a visit to the place responsible for the portmanteau is a must. 'Glamping' is believed to have been coined by a UK journalist after his visit to Paperbark Camp - a luxe 13-tent property, located just minutes from the township of Huskisson and easily accessible from Sydney. Tents are set in the thick of beautiful casuarinas, spotted gums and, of course, paperbarks, while eastern grey kangaroos, brushtail possums, king parrots and crimson rosellas are among Paperbark's regular visitors.

#### THE NAKED CUBBY


As if the name wasn't intriguing enough, The Naked Cubby is all about celebrating "good food, wine and even better company" - a travel trifecta. 'Naked' is a reference to stripping down, letting go of technology, leaving the stress of day-to-day life and reconnecting with yourself or a loved one... and with nature. There are two cubbies, Edgar and Frank, both set on Mount Majura Vineyard, located just outside the nation's capital, Canberra. Guests can stay simple in Edgar or stay 'schmick' (Australian slang for stylish) in Frank. Either way, going Naked (metaphorically or literally – you'll be the only guests on the vineyard, so bare bottoms are encouraged) is a real treat.



#### REEFSLEEP

The Great Barrier Reef is one of Australia's biggest draws. About two million people visit the World Heritage-listed wonder each year, lured by the opportunity to swim, snorkel or dive in the aquatic Eden. Now you can spend the night on it, too. A once-in-a-lifetime experience, Reefsleep's two-day, one-night excursion brings new meaning to the expression 'ocean views'. Guests spend the night on a permanently moored pontoon, in an elevated swag (a sleeping bag with an inbuilt mattress) under a canopy of stars and surrounded by the deep blue. Guided snorkeling safaris, scuba diving and scenic heli-flights are available extras, giving guests a 360-degree look at the technicolor dream.









#### **BELLWETHER WINES**

Set against the grandeur of centuriesold red gums on the Limestone Coast (less than four hours from Adelaide), Bellwether Wines' campsite includes 10 bell tents, all just a short stroll from the tasting room. Each tent is decked out for a cozy stay, including a complimentary bottle of world-famous Coonawarra red wine. Outdoor kitchen facilities are at your disposal, but for something really special, book the Table of Twelve experience - a six-course celebration of fine food, wine and conversation set in a repurposed 1868 shearing shed.

#### KARIJINI ECO RETREAT

In the heart of Karijini National Park, the Karijini Eco Retreat puts guests face-to-face with remarkable ancient landscapes. Glamping is just one of the accommodation options at the environmentally friendly retreat, and each spacious tent has its own deck. A short walk away, the spectacular Joffre Gorge is a sight to behold; its deep, rugged crevices just waiting to be explored. Aboriginal people are known to have lived in the region for at least 20,000 years and the sense of place is truly powerful.



On Sydney's doorstep lies ancient wilderness and urban sophistication.

New of the world's premier cities ✓ have vast wilderness on their doorsteps, but 90 minutes west of Sydney an extravaganza of ridges, cliffs and waterfalls unfolds. The rugged Blue Mountains is a vast landscape of eroded valleys, home to the famous Three Sisters rock formation, which many visitors see only on whirlwind tours. But stay longer and you'll find rainforest and soaring eucalyptus trees loud with cockatoos and king parrots, where lyre birds dance in clearings and kookaburras cackle. No need to rough it in this wilderness, since attractive villages offer sophisticated accommodation and dining.

#### WORLD HERITAGE NATURE

Spectacular walks take you into eucalypt-scented landscapes. One of the easiest along the clifftops between LEURA and **KATOOMBA** is a two-hour showcase of rugged escarpments, waterfalls and vistas such as the aptly named Sublime Point. Sydneysiders love that National Pass walk at WENTWORTH FALLS, down the side of a waterfall and along the middle of cliffs high above the Jamison Valley. Also spectacular is Grand Canyon track near **BLACKHEATH**.

Up for a challenge? Tackle the three-day SIX FOOT TRACK or go canyoning, abseiling or rock climbing.



#### The Blue Mountains is a notable gourmet destination. DARLEYS RESTAURANT offers innovative contemporary Australian cuisine in a Victorian-era homestead, **LEURA GARAGE** is a local favorite for its upmarket cafe-style dishes, and THE WINTERGARDEN serves traditional high tea with a side of spectacular views. Among new restaurants are **ATES** for Mediterranean shared plates and MISTY'S for high-end French fare.

Meanwhile, the Megalong Valley is dotted with olive groves and vineyards including **DRYRIDGE ESTATE**, which produces a zesty riesling. In Katoomba,



There are some places in the world that are a privilege to experience; **LONGITUDE** 131° is one of them. With a bounty of culinary awards to its name, Tali Wiru is all about creative uses of local Australian bush food and blends ancient flavors with contemporary technique: think local spinifex foraged daily or freeze-dried finger lime and Illawarra plums smoked the traditional Indigenous way. As night falls, you'll dine under the stars on a four-course menu matched with Australian wines. Hear tales of the southern night sky from a First Nations perspective and wrap up your magical evening around the campfire with a Ceylon Souchong tea infused with Australian native peach, cinnamon and honey - or something a little stronger.

Champagne and canapés are served among the group where, for the next hour - amid the gentle drone of a didgeridoo your attention is equally shared between the kaleidoscope of sunset colors thrown over Uluru and tasty morsels of smoked kangaroo with native pepperberry yoghurt.

Native Australian flavors feature on the three-course buffet menu, too, with dishes like barramundi with lemon myrtle cream, and native dukkah-crusted kangaroo with organic quinoa. Braised crocodile makes its way into the salad selection, while for dessert there's desert lime cheesecake, apple and quandong crumble, and chocolate and wattleseed slice.

As dinner comes to an end, the resident astronomer or "star talker" takes you on a journey of the magnificent southern night sky, pointing out the Milky Way and the Southern Cross - one of the most familiar star patterns in the Southern Hemisphere and the asterism represented on the Australian national flag. You will also be invited to take a look through telescopes set up to see the ripples, curves and rings of Saturn, Jupiter and the Moon.



#### TASTE OF SUMMER, HOBART

Although small, Tasmania displays a dazzling array of landscapes, from deep wilderness to wind-whipped coasts and serene bays to lush forests. It's little wonder this southern state is bequeathed with a cornucopia of eats such as briny oysters and cool-climate wines, distilleries, amazing cheeses and truly astounding produce. Sample it all at Taste of Summer, which happens every year over the New Year period in HOBART. Expect dining events, a showcase of producers and a NEW YEAR'S EVE party. thetasteofsummer.com.au Getting there: Fly to Hobart from Sydney and Melbourne.



May, KAKADU NATIONAL PARK hosts the Aboriginal food festival Taste of Kakadu in celebration of the area's ancient food history. Here you can learn about bush foods and Aboriginal culture from the local First Nations community. Kakadu is perhaps not what you would expect of the Australian outback; it's a place of lush wetlands, waterfalls and rainforests, and home to some of the country's most exotic wildlife. #### MELBOURNE FOOD AND WINE FESTIVAL, MELBOURNE

Melbourne is considered to be Australia's food capital. The city's funky laneways are crammed with flavor-illuminating eateries and many of the country's best restaurants helmed by award-winning chefs. It would be nearly impossible to understand MELBOURNE's devotion to food and wine in a short trip, so arriving just as the Food and Wine Festival kicks off will give you a good head start. Held every March, the festival has everything from food talks to street fairs, performances, tastings and even an entertaining wine quiz. melbournefoodandwine.com.au *Getting there:* Fly from Sydney in under two hours and Brisbane in under three.

#### TASTING AUSTRALIA, ADELAIDE

Many of Australia's best-loved wineries sit in a cluster just a short distance from the charming city of ADELAIDE. Among them are MCLAREN VALE, ADELAIDE HILLS and the **BAROSSA VALLEY**, regions well worth touring, even without a festival to unite them. To get deeply involved in the food scene of this up-and-coming city and its surrounds, however, plan your trip to coincide with Tasting Australia, which runs for 10 days over April and May. With events held in the city, in regional areas and on the coast, Tasting Australia casts a wide net from the ocean to the fringe of the outback. Experience the freshest seafood, bush foods and everything fortified, foraged and fermented. tastingaustralia.com.au Getting there: Adelaide is a two-hour flight from Sydney or one-and-a-half hours from Melbourne. From there, hop on a number of tours to explore the city's neighboring wine regions.

# Valley of Legends

One of the world's great wine regions, this compact valley made up of gnarled vintage vines, infinite cellar doors and sumptuous local produce packs a tasty punch.

SOUTH AUSTRALIA Barossa Valley



rom Mengler's Hill ookout, the entire Barossa Valley stretches out invitingly like a wrinkled quilt. Lush vine-covered hills and broad fields of golden grain are stitched together by creek beds lined with ancient river red gums. On the edges of the valley, rosella parrots flit between trees in flashes of crimson and royal blue while thick bushland provides a haven for a range of native wildlife. It's easy to see why early European arrivals thought they'd landed in paradise.

On the valley floor, you can still see the spires of the stone churches they built, interspersed with vast modern winemaking facilities. Today there are more than 150 wineries in the Barossa and though Australia's premier wine region is only an hour's drive from ADELAIDE, it feels like another world. This is a place where tradition is as important as innovation and community is paramount. Alongside winemakers, artisanal food producers use timehonored techniques brought over by their ancestors and award-winning chefs take advantage of the natural bounty that has turned this small community of 35,000 people into a thriving food hub.

#### FINE WINE AND FRIENDSHIP

Early Prussian settlers brought with them the Lutheran religion, a strong work ethic and vines to plant on their mixed farmland. Some of the original

1840s plantings still remain and the gnarled vines are among the oldest in the world. Spicy old vine shiraz (syrah) is the hero variety here and full-bodied reds predominate, though you'll also find honey-colored semillon and rich, creamy chardonnays.

Pilgrimage sites abound, and one of the best takes you to the bucolic EDEN **VALLEY** sub-region. Here, the roads are lined with flowering gums and sheep graze alongside 'roos in vast paddocks dotted with outcrops of ruddy ironstone. Henschke's evocatively named HILL OF **GRACE** vineyard sits in the shadow of the idyllic Gnadenberg Church and produces shiraz for Australia's most iconic single vineyard wine. The nearby cellar door is on the site of the original family winery, and it's not uncommon for visitors to find fifth and sixth generation Henschkes continuing the family tradition.

**SEPPELTSFIELD** is no longer run by the Seppelt family, but their legacy is visible in an unbroken lineage of fortified wine that stretches back 143 years. Beginning in 1878, the best barrels of tawny from every vintage have been laid down for the enjoyment of future generations. Walk through the **CENTENNIAL CELLAR** today and you'll be engulfed by a cloud of toffee and almond aromas created by the evaporating tawny. The first barrel was matured for 100 years before being tapped, but today it's possible to sample the vintage from your birth year, significant family milestones or any other year that strikes your fancy.

At the other end of the spectrum, first generation winemaker Abel Gibson is at the forefront of the "new Barossa" movement. From the house where he lives with his young family, he's rescuing neglected vines and making wines that challenge the stereotype of robust Barossa wines. Under the **RUGGABELLUS** label, he produces complex, aromatic and thought-provoking blends that express the region's minerality. Though not a household name yet, it's a fair bet that one day you'll find him on the honor roll in this valley of legends.

One name that's already on that list is **PETER LEHMANN**. Grapes from across the Barossa command a premium, but it wasn't always so. In the 1970s, oversupply led some wineries to renege on agreements with growers and Lehmann was ordered by his bosses to follow suit. He refused, honoring the handshake agreements he'd made, and eventually lost his job as a result. To thank him for his support, people across the Barossa put downpayments on future vintages so that he could start his own label. Today, the winery he founded works with more than 140 local grape growers and his legacy of fairness (and brilliant winemaking) is still evident in this tightknit community.

#### TASTE OF TRADITION

Barossa residents have always prided themselves on their self-sufficiency, and that tradition can still be seen in the range of locals who smoke, pickle,







cure and ferment everything they can get their hands on. Homestyle pâtés, preserves and sauces by legendary Australian food identity MAGGIE BEER can be found in supermarkets across the country, but the best place to taste them is at her FARMSHOP. While you're there, stay for lunch at **THE EATERY** or attend a cooking demonstration.

For something more humble, head to the APEX BAKERY where legend says that the wood-fired scotch oven has burned continuously since it was first lit in 1924. Locals still come in every morning for fresh, slow fermented baked goods and plenty of winemakers will attest to the Cornish pasty's restorative powers as a hangover cure.

Visit the Saturday morning FARMERS' MARKET and you'll find local residents rubbing shoulders with chefs as producers sell everything from eggs and vegetables to fine cheeses and whole legs of pork. Some chefs don't even need to travel that far.

HENTLEY FARM offers a hyperseasonal tasting menu that changes daily as produce becomes available. As much as possible is grown onsite, and after lunch guests can see where it comes from by picking mulberries, visiting the quail hutch or wandering through the onsite herb garden. Neighbors often drop by with excess produce from their gardens, and that generosity is passed onto diners who often find themselves leaving with a jar of freshly made jam or sauce.

#### BEYOND THE CITY

Just 30 minutes by plane from Adelaide, KANGAROO ISLAND is brimming with providores, produce and great wine. Tour vineyards in KINGSCOTE, Cygnet River and on the Dudley Peninsula, try freshlyshucked oysters at American River and sample sugar gum honey at Clifford's Honey Farm. Wildlife attractions include SEAL BAY, Raptor Domain and the Kangaroo Island Wildlife Park. tourkangarooisland.com.au

#### HOME AMONG THE GUM TREES

It's easy to visit the Barossa on a day trip from Adelaide, but spending a few days allows you to really understand the heart of the region. With that extra time you can explore a working sheep station at HUTTON VALE FARM and meet the seventh generation of farmers when they get home from school. Stay in one of the delightfully restored stone cottages and you can watch the broad boughs of 500-year-old gum trees silhouetted against the rising sun from bed. Even better, listen to the melodious warble of nearby magpies amid clouds of steam from the charming outdoor showers.

At THE LOUISE, you can watch the wind ripple the leaves of Peter Lehmann's Stonewell shiraz vineyard next to the spacious suites. The elegant lodge is also home to several dining establishments, where it's not uncommon to run into the winemaker you met earlier that day at a cellar door, or to taste a wine and find the sommelier offering to give you the winemaker's phone number. Because the Barossa is more than just Australia's premier wine region - it's a welcoming community of people who take great pride in what they do.  $\boldsymbol{Q}$ 

#### OTHER SOUTH AUSTRALIAN WINE REGIONS TO VISIT

#### Adelaide Hills McLaren Vale

On the edge of Adelaide's southern suburbs, McLaren Vale occupies an absurdly scenic position between the rolling slopes of the LOFTY RANGES and golden beaches ringed

by limestone cliffs. 120-year-old vines speak to a long winemaking history, but in recent years they've been joined by Mediterranean varietals that thrive with the maritime influence. Venture through groves of olives and almonds and you'll also find a range of organic and biodynamic wineries turning this into Australia's greenest wine region.


Beginning just 20 minutes from Adelaide's city center, it's easy to visit the Adelaide Hills on a day trip. Sinuous roads wind past orchards, dairy farms and native bushland in this cool climate region that's best known for sparkling wines and elegant pinot noir. The BASKET RANGE and **KUITPO** areas are hotbeds of natural wine production and though recent bushfires affected the 2020 vintage, all the cellar doors in the region are still open and even the rustic country pubs boast outstanding wine lists.

Two hours north of Adelaide, the charming Clare Valley offers a relaxed tasting experience along a stunning 25-mile corridor. The cellar doors are rarely crowded, the farm gate stores are full of locally-grown produce, and vineyards overlooked by magnificent old gums produce outstanding zesty rieslings alongside richly flavored reds. Because of its compact nature, the entire valley can be explored on a cycling trail that passes by most of the region's 50 cellar doors.

# OUTBACK ADVENTURES

ustralia's outback is a welcoming place - home to the world's oldest continuous culture and a mysterious ecosystem of creatures that would be difficult to dream up. Here in the nation's backyard, the dirt glows a magical red until the rains carpet it with wildflowers. And sure, it's a vast place, but there's no need to feel overwhelmed. Getting to "the outback" is actually pretty easy, and usually just a short flight away from most capital cities.







#### BRISBANE TO BIRDSVILLE

It's difficult to explain Birdsville's significance to first-time visitors. Giving equal credit to the journey and the destination, this remote town almost 1000 miles inland from the city of Brisbane - is a physical embodiment of the Aussie bush spirit.

At its heart stands Australia's most famous outback pub, **BIRDSVILLE HOTEL**, a veranda-skirted, weathered sandstone building which has been welcoming explorers for 130 years. Spend a night or two here, chatting with the locals

and marveling at the 'Australiana' that binds its interior together – including a ceiling strewn with well-worn Akubra (Dundee-style) hats.

Each year, 6000 pilgrims gather for the **BIRDSVILLE RACES** (*birdsvilleraces*. *com*), which is like an unfettered outback Kentucky Derby, and thousands flock in for the world's most remote rock concert (the **BIG RED BASH**) in July, set below the Simpson Desert's largest sand dune. (bigredbash.com.au)

Whether you fly in directly from Brisbane, or tour the whole Diamantina and Corner Country region (outbackaussietours.com.au), Birdsville will open your eyes and heart to the outback.


#### SYDNEY TO MUNGO NATIONAL PARK

The unearthly landscape of World Heritage-listed Mungo National Park is often compared to something from another planet, but its history is just as interesting. The remains of Mungo Lady and Mungo Man, the oldest Homo Sapiens remains ever found on the Australian continent, were uncovered here, establishing the Aboriginal culture as one of the oldest on Earth.

Despite its otherworldly persona, Mungo is easily accessed via a short 3.5-hour flight from Sydney to the city of MILDURA. From here you can join an organized tour, self-drive or take a scenic flight over the spectacular fossilised lake which deposits you at MUNGO LODGE's red-dirt runway. (mungolodge.com.au)

Mungo's centerpiece, the WALLS **OF CHINA**, is another natural treasure worth exploring. Take an ABORIGINAL **DISCOVERY TOUR** from the visitor center (visitmungo.com.au) to see the astonishing surprises that have come from these fragile sand and clay formations – from ancient fireplaces to the bones of longextinct "megafauna".

Back at eco-friendly Mungo Lodge, browse Indigenous artworks and enjoy a generous meal, before stargazing by campfire light.



is the perfect maiden voyage for outback tenderfoots. Marvel at WILPENA POUND, which looks like a meteor crater but is actually the remnants of a mountain range that once eclipsed the Himalayas. To fully comprehend the 62-mile-wide formation, take a scenic flight over it (wilpenapound.com.au/do/flights) or hike through it on the four-day ARKABA WALK (arkabawalk.com), spending the small hours cozying up in your very own "star bed" (bed under the stars).


"The Flinders", as it's known, is full of quirky stays. Go glamping in a safari tent at **IKARA** (*wilpenapound.com.au*) or bed down in an eco-villa at **RAWNSLEY PARK STATION** (rawnsleypark.com.au).

Sample bush food with a twist at classic pub-turned-gourmet-oasis PRAIRIE HOTEL (prairiehotel.com.au), where adventurous carnivores can try the Feral Mixed Grill (kangaroo, emu and camel) and sweet-tooths the quandong pie (a tangy-tasting native peach).

A three-day tour departing from Adelaide will give you a good introduction to The Flinders, but a weeklong tour will leave you more time to explore vast LAKE EYRE and the striking sandstone tablelands at THE BREAKAWAYS near COOBER PEDY.



AUSTRALIA Outback Made Easy



#### PERTH TO THE KIMBERLEY

The Kimberley region in Australia's far northwest is a barely imaginable, insanely colorful wilderness full to the brim with magnificent contrasts and contradictions.

The short flight from Perth (or Sydney and Melbourne in the 'dry' season) lands you in the laidback, frangipani-treed nirvana of **BROOME**. Wander alongside aqua waters (and boutiques) full of pinctada maxima "mother of pearls" and become part of the sunset on an organized camel ride along 13-mile CABLE BEACH.

From Broome, it's easy to explore the culture of the region's First Nations owners, the Bardi Jawi people, on a tour of the Dampier Peninsula and Cape Leveque, where red dirt and the azure Indian Ocean are separated only by a strip of striking white beach. On Lullumb Tours' (lullumbtours.com.au) Southern Cross Cultural Walk you will learn about hunting and gathering techniques and forage for a coastal feast.

Inland, the dramatic landscape constantly gives up its secrets: grand gorges, clear freshwater swimming holes and HORIZONTAL FALLS. Yet there's no reason to "rough it"; secluded BERKELEY

au) stunning dune-top luxury coastal villas with open-air bathrooms are accessible by seaplane or helicopter. KIMBERLEY COASTAL CAMP and FARAWAY **BAY** are other great sea-facing stays. (kimberleycoastalcamp.com.au; farawaybay. com.au) In East Kimberley, at the homestead on **EL QUESTRO**'s almost 700,000-acre cattle station, you can ease into your outdoor bathtub and

watch CHAMBERLAIN RIVER flow by, as Hollywood A-listers regularly do. (elquestro.com.au) Give yourself at least one week

here – preferably two – because many more Kimberley experiences beckon: from luxury coastal cruises to one of Australia's most epic 4WD adventures, the GIBB RIVER ROAD.

#### DARWIN TO KAKADU

Kakadu is more than twice the size of Yellowstone National Park, but its delights lie in the small details of this culturally rich and biodiverse national park. It's all about getting out there, amongst its spectacular escarpments and lotus-lillied wetlands, just like Paul Hogan did in the classic

Aussie movie Crocodile Dundee, which was filmed here.

Take a dip in the natural infinity pools of GUNLOM FALLS, or hike up to the cascading waterfalls of JIM JIM FALLS. Cruise the tranquil YELLOW WATER BILLABONG amongst millions of migratory birds, including the dancing jabiru (stork), and keep your eyes peeled for lurking "salties" (saltwater crocodiles).

Kakadu is best appreciated through the eyes of its Traditional Owners, the Bininj/Mungguy people, with the highlight for many visitors being the Indigenous-led tour of the millennia-old rock art 'galleries' at UBIRR and other cultural sites.

Kakadu is a three-hour drive from Darwin. Day trips and longer guided tours are available from the city, some with stops at LITCHFIELD NATIONAL PARK and **ARNHEM LAND**. For an above-ground perspective, take a scenic helicopter over the park's wild landscapes.



The pink and green confetti is a medley of native finger lime pearls, house-smoked roe and tiny chive trimmings; the island of coral-pink, a hunk of Petuna ocean trout; and the yellow moon a sunny pool of beurre blanc.


"That looks... something, doesn't it," says my dining neighbor quietly to her friend, eyes widening, admiring the plate. The eight-course degustation at Daylesford's LAKE HOUSE is quite something. From warm, golden orbs of brioche topped with delicate white spanner crab meat, on a bed of leaves; to plump king prawns garnished with Lilliputian strands of sea grapes and sprigs of native succulents, each dish conveys the sense of a garden in miniature.

It's easy to confuse food and art here. Both are in abundant supply, and attention-to-detail is as evident on the plate as it is on the colorful landscapes that line the walls – the work of co-owner Allan Wolf-Tasker. A restaurant-cum-hotel-cum-spa with a fresh, cozy air that feels Hamptonsesque, the Lake House has become something of an Australian icon; it's also often credited with kick-starting gourmet regional tourism. But it's far

from a regional anomaly. This pocket of hinterland – comprising **DAYLESFORD** and the neighboring towns of the MACEDON RANGES, a 1.5-hour drive from Melbourne – has long attracted creative entrepreneurial types seeking respite from the city and looking to transform their passions into their paycheck. In fact, the Macedon Ranges has more professional artists working in the arts per capita than any other region in its home state of Victoria. A bohemian yet thoroughly upmarket enclave, it's brimful of dressmakers, healers, chefs, distillers, winemakers, painters, sculptors, silversmiths and stonemasons.

PART OF Victoria's Goldfields region, Daylesford and its surrounding towns have gone from boom to bust and back again over the years: from the heady days of the local gold rush in the 1850s and 1860s, which saw the area uncover great wealth and bestowed it with many of the



"Once the gold dried up it was sort of abandoned," explains Larissa Wolf-Tasker, the woman responsible for the dreamy interiors of the Lake House, and the daughter of its owners, Alla and Allan Wolf-Tasker. "The region was populated with Europeans - Poles, Russians, Swiss-Italians," she notes. "They settled here because it reminded them a bit of Europe, but also because of the price of the land."

When Larissa's parents purchased the then-barren parcel of land that now houses the Lake House in 1979, starting up a business in Daylesford was unimaginable, she says. But the richly fertile volcanic soils on which the region was built turned out to be a gold mine for produce, and today the region has come full circle.

While prospecting for gold is no longer a drawcard, there are plenty of modern-day riches to unearth here –

HEPBURN BATHHOUSE & SPA. A historic spa and wellness center where old intersects with new, the original building was constructed in 1895, though today the complex has a distinctly modern edge. Soft, tree-diffused light streams in through tall, floor-to-ceiling windows, and the stark contours of timber and stone lend a zen, minimalist feel. Drawn straight from the source, the bathhouse's healing waters are rich in magnesium, calcium and silica, relieving muscle aches and pains. Soak in them while taking a private mineral bath surrounded by candles, tracing the mineral deposits they've left on the stone tub with your fingertips; wallow in the warm social baths and try to spy rock wallabies, which bound through the bush outside at dusk and dawn; float in the circular magnesium salt pool and gaze up into blue skies through the mammoth oculus in the roof; and, when your toes are at their pruney peak, bask on one of the sun deck's loungers in your robe while enjoying afternoon tea.

"Because of the experience of our therapists, the energetic work will always come through. We work internally rather than externally; that's a quality all our healers have." I opt for a signature Archangel Aromatherapy Healing Ritual and it's one of the most reinvigorating massages I've ever tried. From the initial dabble in foot reflexology, to the elements of lomi lomi massage and the tapping into pressure points that sends me into an almost trance-like state, the treatment is all about release and flow of energy, whatever bespoke combination of techniques that requires.

AT THE quaint and storied nearby town of KYNETON, a small Ayurvedic practice taps into the holistic side of wellness, too. An Aladdin's cave of lanterns, crystals, wall hangings, patterned textiles and brightly painted walls, MAIAVEDA is housed within a beautiful flour mill that dates back to the 1860s and oozes character. Just as memorable as the historic building is Marye, Maiaveda's founder, who radiates warmth and openness, and channels positive energy.

"We create a space for our clients," she says, gesturing to the locked front door and noting that the practice phone is switched off. We take a brief meditation and a foot bath prior to my massage, which focuses on the 'marma points', or energy centers, somewhat akin to acupressure.

While the region's many spas and springs afford a compelling antidote to the stresses of the daily grind, it's **•** 







when coupled with the local slow food movement, the ubiquitous art and the idyllic landscapes that the region begins to outshine its rivals. From the pure, country Victorian air to the deliciously languid pace of life, a strong sense of serenity pervades these foothills of the Great Dividing Range.

Even the single-lane highway between Daylesford and Kyneton feels wholesome and peaceful: small roadside stands purvey pots of pure local honey, hand-painted wooden signs fixed to tree trunks advertise free-range eggs, narrow country lanes lead to wineries, lavender farms and cherry orchards. The winding road itself is postcard-worthy; ghost gums and stringybark trees arch over it to create a sun-dappled corridor. And just like each dish at the Lake House, the flashes of golden paddocks dotted with hay bales and black cows next to the road here could easily pass for a watercolor painting.



#### KANGAROO

One half of the national coat of arms (the other is the emu), the **KANGAROO** is one of the country's most celebrated animals. There are four different species of KANGAROO: THE RED; ANTILOPINE; EASTERN GREY; and WESTERN GREY. The Red holds the distinction of being the world's largest marsupial; some males stand as tall as six feet and weigh in at 200 pounds.

*Fast fact:* There are more kangaroos than humans in Australia (roughly 50 million versus 25.7 million), with an estimated 15.8 million red kangaroos alone. Where to see them: You'll find kangaroos all over Australia. They're social creatures, so chances are if you see one there are more close by. They rest during the heat of the day, so the best time to catch sight of them is at dawn and dusk.





# wild WORLD

Australia boasts a weird and wonderful menagerie of creatures on land, sea and air.

#### KOALA

When it comes to the Aussie animal most visitors want to tick off their list, chances are it's the KOALA. This impossibly cute tree-dwelling marsupial mammal survives on a diet exclusively made up of eucalyptus leaves. The trees are also their home, with koalas spending up to 19 hours a day sleeping in them before waking up to feed at night, making them largely **NOCTURNAL**. While koalas have a pouch like kangaroos, they are more closely related to the wombat. *Fast fact:* While they look all chubby and cuddly, koalas have seriously sharp claws and when threatened can run as fast as a rabbit.

Where to see them: Due to the fact that they spend most of their time up trees, koalas can be elusive to spot in the wild. Keep an eye out for them along the GREAT OCEAN ROAD and on **RAYMOND ISLAND** in Victoria, and around **PORT** STEPHENS and PORT MACQUARIE in New South Wales.



#### WOMBAT

These chubby creatures live in burrows and emerge at night to feast on a diet of grasses, bark and roots. Consisting of three species - the COMMON WOMBAT, the NORTHERN HAIRY-NOSED WOMBAT and the **SOUTHERN HAIRY-NOSED WOMBAT** – wombats are an evolutionary wonder: they have a pouch like other marsupials but it faces backwards so that it doesn't fill with dirt when they are digging. And its rump consists mostly of cartilage so that when it retreats headfirst into its hole it is almost impossible for predators to get a grip on. Fast fact: WOMBATS' POOP is shaped like a cube. The theory is that as they mark their territory by defecating, the shape stops it from rolling away. <u>Where to see them:</u> Wombats thrive in cool, damp environments, so you have a good chance of spotting them in places like cradle mountain-lake st clair NATIONAL PARK and MARIA ISLAND

in Tasmania, WILSONS PROMONTORY NATIONAL PARK in Victoria, and the SOUTHERN HIGHLANDS, less than two hours from Sydney.

POSSUM

carry things. just look up.

A marsupial cousin of the kangaroo, **WALLABIES** are widely found across the country. Smaller than kangaroos, there are some 30 species of wallaby in Australia including the **ROCK WALLABY**, **SWAMP** WALLABY and the TAMMAR WALLABY, all of which hop to get around, tend to be more active at dawn and dusk, and carry their young in a pouch. Unlike kangaroos, however, wallabies are solitary creatures. *Fast fact:* If a wallaby becomes pregnant while she still has a JOEY (BABY) in her pouch, she can pause the gestation of the new embryo until its sibling has vacated the space.



When you are out and about at night in Australia, whether in the heart of SYDNEY or in the wilds of FREYCINET NATIONAL PARK in TASMANIA, chances are you will catch a glimpse of either a COMMON BRUSHTAIL POSSUM or a COMMON RINGTAIL POSSUM, the most prolific of Australia's 23 species of possums. With their soft fur and sweet faces, possums are one of the easiest marsupials to spot as they are quite adventurous in the pursuit of food. And if you can't see them, you're sure to hear them; researchers have identified at least 18 different sounds made by possums including screeching, hissing and grunting.

*Fast fact:* Both brushtail and ringtail possums have prehensile tails, which they use as a type of hand to cling to trees and

#### KOOKABURRA

Australia is home to abundant birdlife, but none is more genuinely wondrous than the KOOKABURRA. Also known as the Laughing Kookaburra, this KINGFISHER is famous for its loud and clear call that sounds like a hearty belly laugh but is actually a method to warn other birds off its territory. *Fast fact:* Kookaburras are believed to pair for life, so when you see one bird its mate will most likely be nearby. Where to see them: Found predominantly on the EAST COAST, you will usually hear them before you see them.

#### TASMANIAN DEVIL

Found exclusively on the island state from which it gets its name, this carnivorous marsupial is actually a lot like its Looney Tunes cartoon persona, a snarling, irascible whirlwind of teeth and attitude. With a vocabulary of growls, grunts and snarls, they are vociferous (and slightly vicious) when threatened or protecting their food. Fast fact: Further cementing its reputation, the TASMANIAN DEVIL has the most powerful bite of any animal in the world based on its size. Where to see them: As the devil is nocturnal, it is difficult to see in the wild; instead visit the Tasmanian Devil Conservation Park in TARANNA, an easy drive from Hobart, BONORONG WILDLIFE SANCTUARY, north of Hobart, or DEVILS@ CRADLE WILDLIFE PARK near Cradle Mountain National Park.

Tho doesn't dream of a bluesky escape to a sand-fringed island of tropical warmth, where palm trees wave and sunsets turn a sapphire sea pink in time for cocktails? Welcome to Hamilton Island, where time slows down and urban stress peels away. Its domestic airport has short, direct flights from Australia's international gateway cities Brisbane, Melbourne and Sydney, making qualia a great base to explore the Great Barrier Reef. Allow us to inspire you with this ultimate itinerary.

#### DAY ONE

#### OUT IN THE BAY

Your trip is likely to coincide with an event, such as FALLS FESTIVAL (December-January), BLUESFEST (April), SPLENDOUR IN THE GRASS (July), BYRON WRITERS FESTIVAL (August) or one of several others happening year round. The BYRON MARKETS are held on the first Sunday of every month and are a must-do while you're here. Alongside colorful stallholders selling handcrafted wares, locally grown produce and art of all kinds, you can expect to see bongo players, live music acts, tarot readers and plenty of health potions and elixirs. The same is true of the nearby **BANGALOW** MARKETS (fourth Sunday of each month), although a visit to the historic and charming town center won't disappoint

The Byron area is a veritable food bowl, vibrant as the produce at the farmers markets (held every Thursday morning). From fine dining to more casual eateries, you won't be lost for where to find your next meal. Book into the awardwinning **FLEET** (*fleet-restaurant.com.au*) in nearby Brunswick Heads for a special dinner, and HARVEST (harvest.com.au) in Newrybar for a long lunch. The BEACH HOTEL's (*beachhotel.com.au*) expansive outdoor area overlooks Byron's Main Beach - perfect for sunset cocktails and you'll find fresh fare with a typically laidback Byron feel at CHUPACABRA (chupacabra.com.au), cult coffeeshop **TOP SHOP** (topshopbyronbay.com.au) and THE BYRON BAY GENERAL STORE (byrongeneralstore.com)



Then it comes to island paradises, they don't come more idyllic and sun-kissed than the Whitsundays, a collection of 74 tropical islands scattered like confetti across the waters of the UNESCO World Heritage-listed Great Barrier Reef Marine Park, off the coast of Queensland.

While only a handful of the islands are actually inhabited, the ones that are present an irresistible travel proposition, dotted as they are with world-class resorts and offering up sun, sea and sand in abundance.

Hamilton Island is the gateway into this island experience, with daily flights from Melbourne, Sydney, Brisbane and Cairns. From there, a collection of luxe island retreats are within easy reach.

Hayman Island (haymanisland.intercontinental.com), managed by InterContinental Hotel Group, is one of world's most iconic private island resorts. A \$79 million refurbishment completed in 2019 saw a collection of new restaurants and bars installed, as well as the three-bedroom Hayman Beach House.

On Daydream Island (daydreamisland.com), a longtime holiday favorite with families, the amazing eco-friendly Living Reef coral lagoon wraps around the resort and includes a stunning underwater observatory.

Both Orpheus Island and Heron Island, meanwhile, pride themselves on their impeccable eco credentials, with guests (only 28 in total on Orpheus Island) able to indulge in familiar island pursuits such as diving and snorkeling, or embrace their inner eco warrior and tour a marine research station. Q

Although the town has grown a lot in recent years, the heart of Byron Bay (Byron to just about everyone) will always beat to the sound of a bongo drum. Before it became the hippie mecca of Australia, Byron was an unassuming, chilled-out coastal town with a slow pace of life. There are plenty to choose from, but ELEMENTS OF BYRON offers a complimentary sunrise class to their guests (elementsofbyron.com.au). Alternatively, head into the lush hills behind Byron to have your aura read or meditate in a crystal cave at the CRYSTAL **CASTLE** (*crystalcastle.com.au*). Or simply check into one of the ubiquitous spas, such as the award-winning GAIA RETREAT

& SPA (gaiaretreat.com.au).

Byron's overabundance of natural gifts was another attraction for artists, surfers and nirvana-seekers all those years ago. To truly absorb its astounding beauty, rise early to start the CAPE BYRON WALK at CLARKE'S BEACH. You're likely to spot dolphins as you meander by THE PASS and **WATEGOS** beaches and along clifftops. Between June and October, whales are virtually obligated to give you a wave. Once at the famed lighthouse, take the path down to the most easterly point in Australia so you can brag about it later.

t wasn't so long ago that fine dining in Brisbane or the Gold Coast was widely perceived as having the choice between salad or fries with your main meal; and culture involved going to a movie on the weekend.

Outsiders referred to Brisbane as Bris-Vegas with tongues firmly-in-cheek, but it was the antithesis of the 24-hour US super-city. Then a funny thing happened; Brisbane turned into one of the fastest growing metropolises in the western world. New five-star hotels, innovative speakeasies and bars, and gourmet eateries opened all across the city, and locals reclaimed the name Bris-Vegas as a badge of pride. It summed up the energy of Australia's new hippest city (everyone from Forbes to GQ Australia has anointed it Australia's coolest city).

At the same time the Gold Coast popular since the '50s as the place for families with its offerings of theme parks and family restaurants – has emerged as one of Australia's unlikeliest cultural hotspots (to go with its 35-mile strip of famous beaches), making the Gold Coast and Brisbane the best new double act in Australian tourism.

I grew up here and, after traveling the world, I chose to move back here with my American-born wife. And I'm not

alone; these days Melburnians and Sydneysiders are moving to Brisbane and the Gold Coast in the thousands each year, and international travelers are flocking here to experience the new cosmopolitan additions and wonderfully Australian laidback pace of life.

#### WALK THE WALK

The first thing you need to know about Brisbane is that it's the perfect walking city for visitors. Set around a slowmoving river (the imaginatively named BRISBANE RIVER), which snakes its way through neighborhoods, parks and the city center, you can walk between the best cultural and entertainment areas with ease.

One such place is **HOWARD SMITH** WHARVES. Located on the edge of the city center, these historic wharves along the Brisbane River, created by the government during the Great Depression to provide jobs, stood silent and neglected for 50 years before recently being transformed into Australia's best new waterside entertainment and lifestyle development.

Here you'll find CRYSTALBROOK VINCENT, a hotel carved into the

sandstone cliffs above the river where the works of artist Vincent Fantauzzo feature prominently throughout the property (and lend it its name), and the pool deck is the place to be.

Brisbane's hippest locals gather for craft brews at FELONS BREWING CO., or for cocktails at MR PERCIVAL'S a riverfront bar with a European beach club vibe. The dining choices include the much lauded YOKO DINING, with its Japanese izakaya menu, and the contemporary Greek taverna, GRECA **RESTAURANT**, both courtesy of the prolific Gold Coast-born restaurateur Jonathan Barthelmess. From Howard Smith Wharves, it's

a five minute-walk to the sub-tropical CITY BOTANIC GARDENS, 42 acres of landscaped gardens sitting pretty by the river, teeming with wildlife. Amble a little further, heading across the river, to Brisbane's cultural hub of SOUTHBANK, home to the country's largest gallery of modern art, THE QUEENSLAND GALLERY OF MODERN ART, the QUEENSLAND PERFORMING ARTS CENTRE, the QUEENSLAND MUSEUM and the QUEENSLAND CULTURAL CENTRE.

#### CAPITAL OF COOL

One of the most conspicuous indicators of Brisbane's regeneration is the proliferation of new hotels that now dot the landscape. Prior to the arrival of the internationally renowned W brand in Brisbane back in 2018, there hadn't been a new five-star hotel constructed in the city for 20 years. Now visitors can take their pick: THE W BRISBANE and the newly opened **THE WESTIN** both position themselves as urban retreats in the heart of the city; The Westin has Brisbane's first swim-up bar and the first **HEAVENLY** DAY SPA in Australia, while W Brisbane's **WET DECK** roof-top bar offers cocktails overlooking the river.

Then there's **THE CALILE HOTEL**. Located in Fortitude Valley, Brisbane's trendiest neighborhood (it's a 10-minute walk from the center of the city), the property has fashioned itself as Australia's first 'urban resort'; it's seven stories of urban chic that's as much South Beach Miami as it is Queensland tropics. Take up position in a poolside cabana and order a cocktail, or sample awardwinning Greek fare at one of Brisbane's best restaurants, **HELLENIKA**.

The boutique stores located in The Calile's lobby (including local favorites BASSIKE, CAMILLA AND MARC, BEC AND BRIDGE and MISTER ZIMI) lead out to JAMES STREET, a former industrial block in a dodgy part of the city that is now one of Australia's foremost retail and lifestyle strips, with more than 130 specialty stores, art galleries, design showrooms, restaurants and bars – the perfect metaphor for Brisbane itself.

#### GOLD RUSH

Once you've exhausted Brisbane's myriad delights, it's easy to access the Gold Coast (50 miles south) via train or shuttle. While the region is spread across 35 miles of sparkling coastline, the Gold Coast itself is built on a grid and can be explored by public buses, light rail, taxi or Uber.

The aptly named **SURFERS PARADISE** neighborhood ("Surfers" to locals) has long been the Coast's focal point, and has undergone a trendy transformation, spearheaded by the likes of US bar and restaurant brand **HYDE PARADISO** launching its first foray into Australia in the city (its cocktails are large and its beach views are to die for) and the launch of the Gold Coast's newest cultural district, **HOME OF THE ARTS** (HOTA). Set on 42 acres of parkland, the development is part of a \$250 million investment



into arts and music on the Coast, with theater, dance, comedy and opera on offer, and a six-level art gallery which opened in May 2021.

The Gold Coast is also now home to some of Australia's most innovative regional restaurants. In the surf village of **BURLEIGH HEADS**, eight miles south of Surfers Paradise, **RICK SHORES** is so close to the waves on Burleigh's world-famous point that the floors are rendered in concrete in order to allow for water to wash through when the tide's extra-high. You can watch local surfers riding the waves as you sample its pan-Asian dishes for lunch or dinner. Next door, millions has been invested into the Coast's first beach club, **BURLEIGH PAVILION**,





with a menu chosen by Michelin-starred chef, Guillaume Zika.

It's the restaurants you have to look for, however, that really epitomise this new sophisticated Gold Coast. I walked past IKU YAKITORI WHISKY BAR three times before finding the entrance in an alleyway behind. Inside, Japanese chefs cook over hot Binchotan charcoal. Just south (by bus or taxi), THE COLLECTIVE AT **PALM BEACH** is a buzzing two-story open-air venue that was once the post office, but now houses five-restaurantsin-one (and a cocktail menu with more than 50 choices).

Accommodation options also reflect this subtlety in style. In Burleigh Heads, stay at **BON SOL** (a stunning offering from Brisbane-based design star Anna Spiro), an unassuming '60s apartment block that invokes 1950s St Tropez, complete with beach club service; and further south in Coolangatta, THE PINK **HOTEL** might've been lifted straight out of 1970s-era Malibu.

Down the road at **DUST TEMPLE** in CURRUMBIN WATERS (seven miles south



of Burleigh Heads), I order a soy latte as a guitar duo strum amongst an art exhibition in a converted warehouse. A few streets away you'll find Australia's highest-rated craft beer, BALTER, created within a trendy brewery set up by surfing champs Mick Fanning, Joel Parkinson, Josh Kerr, and Bede Durbidge and frequented by surfer-types.

With so much to eat, drink and do, it might slip your mind to give due attention to the beaches in this

buzz-worthy region, but you should. The Gold Coast is home to some of the world's most iconic waves (with more surf schools than any other place in Australia), and they also make a heck of a spot for a swim or some sunbathing. Most beaches are just a short walk from all these hip new restaurants, bars, art galleries and cafes, meaning style on the Gold Coast comes served up with plenty of sunscreen.

#### WHERE IS IT?

The sunny Sunshine Coast is roughly 65 miles north of Brisbane. There are direct flights to Sunshine Coast Airport from Brisbane, Sydney and Melbourne. You can also travel from Brisbane by shuttle bus, with stops at **NOOSA**, CALOUNDRA and MOOLOOLABA.

#### ONE GREAT WALK NOOSA NATIONAL PARK

is home to a 3.4-mile (6.7-mile return) track that traces the coast through rainforest, eucalyptus trees and wildflowers. On this spectacular COASTAL WALK you might spot koalas, dolphins, turtles, and humpback whales (in the right season).

#### BEST BEACHES

We rate KINGS BEACH in Caloundra for families, COOLUM BEACH for a quieter laidback vibe, NOOSA NATIONAL PARK for surfing, and MOOLOOLABA for its good looks and energetic esplanade.



here is no single, defining Australian journey. Why? Because this country and its people are too diverse. Sure, there are constants. We unreservedly love exploring life in our "great outdoors". We like to take it easy with people who make us laugh, and enjoy our food and wine, which we humbly think is the best in the world. These eight quintessentially Australian journeys take a little from columns A, B and C. Enjoy them - we do!

#### Our Rock, our heart: Uluru

**ULURU IS INTENSELY SACRED TO ITS** TRADITIONAL OWNERS, AND AN UNOFFICIAL PILGRIMAGE FOR VISITORS AND AUSTRALIANS ALIKE. FOR SOME, IT'S ENOUGH TO MAKE IT TO 'THE ROCK' AND DRINK IN ITS ENORMITY (5.8 MILES AROUND) UP CLOSE, WALKING OR CYCLING ITS PERIMETER. OTHERS APPRECIATE IT FROM AFAR, INSIDE ONE OF THE MOST LUXURIOUS GLAMPSITES ON EARTH: LONGITUDE 131°, OR VIA A SUNSET HELICOPTER JAUNT, WHICH PUTS ULURU-KATA TJUTA NATIONAL PARK'S VAST DESERT-SCAPE INTO PERSPECTIVE.





#### AN 'OUTBACK CRUISE': THE KIMBERLEY

Australians are a humble people, but believe us when we say that the KIMBERLEY in Western Australia is one of the world's last great wilderness areas. The best part? You can experience it from the water in laidback luxury from your balcony suite. Starting in carefree **BROOME** on the north-west coast (less than three hours by air from Perth), cruise the vibrant coastline where the aqua Indian Ocean and ocher-red earth battle for your attention. Remote (328-foot-high) KING GEORGE FALLS will undoubtedly impress; jump onboard your ship's helicopter to find a picnic spot among its upper rock pools.

#### THE GREAT OCEAN ROAD(TRIP)

This coast-hugging road trip (starting just outside MELBOURNE) swirls you through seaside towns with fairytale names, such as PORT FAIRY and APOLLO BAY, and past the 150-feet-high 12 Apostles, which rise dramatically from the Southern Ocean. Otway National Park's temperate rainforest begs you to take a hike, with eyes peeled for resting koalas. If you aren't interested in self-driving, private tours and guided walks are readily available options. ▶





#### HEART REEF: GREAT BARRIER REEF

A private helicopter or seaplane flight to this tiny, heart-shaped composition of coral in the world's largest reef system is a journey you won't soon forget. Board your aircraft from HAMILTON ISLAND, one of 74 **WHITSUNDAY ISLANDS** and the gateway to the Great Barrier Reef. On the way out to Heart Island, ask your pilot to stop at one of the Whitsunday's most well-known (and pristine) beaches, WHITEHAVEN. With Heart Reef seared into your psyche, return to Hamilton Island for a tranquil week in the tropics at a Polynesianstyle bungalow or in five-star luxury at gualia resort.

#### FINE TIMES ABOVE THE VINES: BAROSSA VALLEY

As dawn breaks, soar over this classic Australian landscape in a hot air balloon, taking in the panoramic vineyard views, and toast with a **BAROSSA** sparkling upon touch down. Located just over an hour from the city of **ADELAIDE** and home to more than 150 wineries, including legendary producers **PENFOLDS** and **SEPPELTSFIELD** – not to mention some of Australia's finest restaurants and farmers markets – there's still plenty to do in the Barossa with two feet firmly on the ground.



#### THE GHAN: ON TRACK TO CENTRAL AUSTRALIA

The Ghan's 1,851-mile trajectory covers a spellbinding cross-section of the country, from the bustling laneways of ADELAIDE to DARWIN'S tropical hues. Unlike AMTRAK, this train - whose 90-year heritage celebrates the Afghan cameleers who helped 'build the outback' is pure Golden Age of Rail.

Simply watch the outback go by in your elegant private cabin, while being waited on by disarmingly friendly Aussies. Or "get off your bum", as we say, for some quirky excursions, such as visiting underground homes in the Wild West-style opal town of **COOBER PEDY**, taking a leisurely outback day-hike looking for rock wallabies, or exploring the desert landscape from a fitting position atop a camel.



#### A BIRD'S-EYE VIEW: SYDNEY

**SYDNEY'S** sparkling harbor is reason enough to make it the first stop on your Down Under adventure, and there's no better way to see it than from the sky. Seaplanes regularly depart from **ROSE BAY**, taking in the Sydney Harbour Bridge and Sydney Opera House, before soaring over the khaki scrubland of KU-RING-GAI CHASE NATIONAL PARK. Gently swoop down to the bush-enveloped **BEROWRA WATERS** INN to feast on a seven-course menu of 'modern Australian' cuisine.

PASS THROUGH SLEEPY TOWNS TO REACH FREYCINET MARINE FARM, WHERE YOU CAN SAMPLE 'TASSIE' OYSTERS STRAIGHT FROM THE SOURCE AND, FINALLY, REST YOUR HAPPY HEAD AT ONE OF THE DESIGN-DRIVEN COASTAL PAVILIONS AT FREYCINET LODGE.



AUSTRALIA'S SUNNIEST CITY, PERTH IS AN IDYLLIC COMBINATION OF URBAN BUZZ AND COASTAL COOL - HOME TO PRISTINE BEACHES, WORLD-CLASS DINING AND WIDE-OPEN SPACES.

#### WALK THE CITY

Perth is home to more than 200 public artworks; see some of the city's best on display on the two-hour Art City walking trail starting at ELIZABETH QUAY, taking in Kings Square and Cathedral Square and ending at PERTH CONCERT HALL. Download the trail map at experienceperth.com.

#### GETTING AROUND

Travel around Perth for free on a Central Area Transit (CAT) bus. Four different routes operate in and around the city with stops at KING STREET PRECINCT, Elizabeth Quay, and Kings Park and BOTANIC GARDEN. To travel further, jump on a public bus or the city's trains and ferries.

'm standing in the MEELUP **REGIONAL PARK** on Western Australia's Leeuwin-Naturaliste ridge, looking down over the coastal plain toward the Indian Ocean. It's almost the end of my first day visiting the Margaret River region, and I'm listening to Wadandi man Josh Whiteland describe life here for his people - the Traditional Owners of this part of Western Australia's South West - thousands of years ago. Josh points out the surrounding native flora: yellow banksias like candlesticks, dried-out melaleucas and low-lying eucalyptus still holding their blossoms.

"The rain doesn't stop until the blossom falls," Josh says, fondling the thinning white flowers in his palm. "So, more rain coming."

Josh is a cultural custodian and owner of cultural tourism company KOOMAL DREAMING, where he imparts his Indigenous cultural knowledge to visitors through cave and bush walks, stories, and native food and fishing experiences. I've signed up for the NGILGI CAVE CULTURAL TOUR to hear Josh play the didgeridoo deep inside a cave, acknowledging the spirits that dwell here. It's late afternoon, and the day's uncharacteristic heat subsides as we descend into the limestone and granite cavern that's typical along this coast. With our small group now alone in the underground chamber, Josh starts playing his didgeridoo and the vibrating sound reverberates around the natural amphitheatre, meeting the silence rather than interrupting it. I experience the onset of the lasting feeling of peace one can find in Margaret River – steeped in this rich Wadandi history and incredible natural environment.



Vanya Cullen, who celebrated 30 years as Chief Winemaker at CULLEN WINES in 2019. One of the region's founding estates, Cullen Wines is an example of benchmark Margaret River cabernet and chardonnay, but also an example of what can be achieved through biodynamic farming. Having championed the practice since the early 2000s, Vanya says her commitment to sustainability

is owed in part to her connection to the land (she grew up on the property long before the first wines were planted in 1971) and to the legacy left by her wine-legend parents; one that goes well beyond their namesake wines.

"Mum and Dad left this legacy to care about the earth," Vanya explains. "That's on top of the energetic history of the Wadandi people, who lived by those principles for tens of thousands of years. To that end, Cullen is now certified





biodynamic and carbon negative, so we have the whole business giving more back to the earth than we're taking. To see that all come together in my lifetime is amazing."

The results of Vanya's efforts to craft quality wines using sustainable practices speak for themselves; the country's leading wine critic James Halliday awarded her 2020 Winemaker of the Year. But she says the real winner is actually the land and, with many other flagship wineries in the region now in organic conversion, her conviction is starting to spread.

"The dream is to see the whole of Margaret River foregoing synthetic chemicals," Vanya says. "So it's really exciting to see so many big wineries in transition."

From Cullen Wines, I head next door to **VASSE FELIX** for lunch. This is where Margaret River wine started, when Dr Tom Cullity first planted row upon row of cabernet sauvignon, shiraz, malbec and riesling to establish the Vasse Felix vineyard - Margaret River's pioneering estate – in 1967. Estate sommelier Evan Gill takes me through a tasting of their core wine family: three chardonnays, three cabernets, a shiraz and a sauvignon blanc semillon.

"The heart of Vasse Felix is in our cabernet sauvignon," he says. We're seated in the estate's wine lounge, which overlooks the original vineyard. Gesturing toward the block of 'cab sauv', he tells me: "It was sited well." Cullity based his original plantings on a muchlauded report by Dr John Gladstone, who identified the Margaret River cape as ideal for grape growing. "This is where Gladstone said we should plant,"

says Evan. "Our wines are a homage to that research."

Today, the estate hosts a restaurant, lounge and cellar door, a wine museum (housed in an original vault) showcasing extensive back vintage wines, and an art gallery – not to mention four vineyards throughout the region that are all NASAA Certified Organic. The wine and food produced at Vasse Felix, by chief winemaker Virginia Willcock and head chef Brendan Pratt, is tasty evidence of the same underlying philosophy.

Both visits are a display of the passion that drives those who call Margaret River home. Over the course of my three-day visit, it proves to be a common theme. I see it on a leisurely sail near Meelup in SAILING CHARTERS

wA's skipper Luke Johnston, who grew up sailing this aquamarine coast with his grandfather and father; and riding fat bikes through the **BORANUP** KARRI FOREST with Cam O'Beirne of MARGARET RIVER ADVENTURE COMPANY. Cam details the region's historical timber trade like a memoir, and describes the forest as a medium for connection. I see it again walking the epic CAPE TO CAPE TRACK with local WALK INTO LUXURY guide Anne Guthrie, who tells stories about exploring the cape's rocky bays and bushlands as a child growing up here in the 1970s. I see it exploring the flavors of main-strip Margaret River with ex-journalist Kellie Tannock of WALK TALK TASTE, who seems to overflow with anecdotes about the town's historical and present-day. From winemaker to walking food tour guide, everyone I meet has a reverence for the region's history and natural landscape that informs their daily life and work, and a genuine love for sharing it.

This means good things for the region's future. At ARIMIA, the farm-totable restaurant in  $\ensuremath{\texttt{WILYABRUP}}$  where Ihave lunch one day, this bright future is now. I dine with owner and farmer Ann Spencer, who looks after 138 acres of almost entirely self-sufficient vineyard and working farm, as well as the offgrid restaurant headed up by chef and business partner Evan Hayter.

Just as the likes of Cullen and Vasse Felix represent the origins of Margaret River wine, Arimia represents the future of its gastronomy. It's another one of the region's wineries undergoing biodynamic certification, already operating with a no-waste principle and farming regeneratively to establish living soils.

They produce their own olive oil and honey, raise their own pigs, farm their own trout and tend a one-acre vegetable garden, with a goal to eventually serve only what's grown on the property.

"It's a full circle thing," Ann explains. "We are producing our own food, in a manner that respects the land we are using, the resulting dish and the diner. I want people to really get the difference between eating good food, and eating here where not only is the food good, but you also know where it comes from."

Between dishes like cured trout with miso and ginger, char-grilled beets with avocado gel, Davidson plum sherbet and fried warrigal, Ann and I talk about Margaret River's natural abundance, and how eating here tells a story. Story is an important part of life in the region. Aside from those born and bred in Margaret River, everyone I meet has a story of how they came to be here; of what life they left behind, deciding there must be more and finding it among the karri and the marri trees, between these three coastlines, among the vines or on a surging wave.

If you visit, you might find that you go home dreaming of one day telling a Margaret River story of your own.




plump young wombat grazing on the marsupial lawn is unbothered by the small group of onlooking hikers. Its tousled coat of summertime fur has distinctly blonde tips, bleached almost white by the strong Australian sun, like the hair of a dedicated, suntanned surfer. A nearby herd of wallabies is jumpier than usual at the sight of humans, and a joey instinctively dives headfirst back into its mother's pouch so only its gangly hind legs are visible.

Surrounding this patch of open grassland is a forest of eucalypts and casuarinas from where wattle birds sweetly call and raucous kookaburras laugh (who knows at what or why). Ancient dolerite peaks rise above the treetops, just begging to be climbed, and two sea eagles circle the rocky outcrops. In the other direction, a white sandy beach seems to stretch on forever, edging a calm bay of turquoise water where dolphins bask and play. Just a few miles away, across a small passage, is the mainland of Tasmania.

This is MARIA ISLAND (pronounced Mariah, as in Carey), a 45-square-mile island off the east coast of Australia's island state of Tasmania. Essentially an island off an island off an island, Maria is considered by many to be the Noah's Ark of Tasmania.

Led by young local guides who know the place like the backs of their hands, the MARIA ISLAND WALK (mariaislandwalk.com.au) covers more than 20 miles on foot over four days. Wombats and wallabies are a common sight as are kangaroos, wedge-tailed eagles, swift parrots and native hens (known locally as "turbo chooks"). There is also a healthy population of Tasmanian devils on the island and, despite their name and propensity for vociferous nighttime screeching, the world's largest carnivorous marsupial is

no threat to humans.

Maria Island is now entirely designated as a national park without any permanent human residents. In the not-so-distant past, the island was home to the Oyster Bay nation community of Tasmanian Aboriginals who called it Toarra Marra Monah. Maria's grimmest days were during the 1800s when it was used as a convict settlement. Today, Cape Barren geese patrol the historic convict-era buildings of Darlington like reincarnated prison guards.

Once you've signed up for the Maria Island Walk experience you'll be collected from your central Hobart accommodation, such as the boutique hotel **MOSS**, occupying a historic building on the waterfront at SALAMANCA PLACE, and driven to Triabunna for a private boat transfer across Mercury Passage for a barefoot beach landing. Accommodation is two nights in glamping tents and one in a heritage homestead. Fresh gourmet meals are prepared daily by the guides.

Hiking trails connect Darlington in the north with Haunted Bay in the south. The distinctive 148-foot Bishop and Clerk and 2333-foot Mt Maria are optional peaks to bag; exposed 300-million-year-old fossils can be seen in some of the island's cliff faces. In the colder months of June to August, Maria Island Walk offers a three-day winter hiking experience.

Back across the water on the Tasmanian mainland there are plenty of other walks to keep you on your feet and surrounded by beauty.

#### WUKALINA WALK

The moment you step foot on Australia's southern heart-shaped island state you are in the cultural homeland of the palawa (Tasmanian Aboriginal) people. Here, wukalina Walk is Tasmania's first Aboriginal owned and operated guided walk and you are warmly invited to "takara waranta" – walk with us.

This is a four-day experience in Tasmania's north-east departing from **LAUNCESTON. CHANGE OVERNIGHT,** Australia's first social enterprise hotel, is a short walk from the Aboriginal Elders Council of Tasmania meeting point or you can easily be collected from a range of other hotels.

The 20-mile walk in LARAPUNA/BAY OF FIRES and WUKALINA (MT WILLIAM NATIONAL PARK) takes you to places well beyond superficial appreciation of the area's pristine beaches and photogenic orange lichen. Hear creation stories, learn about cultural practices, try bush tucker, stay in award-winning architecturally designed sleeping pods, walk up to 10.5 miles a day and come away with genuine insights into palawa culture and their connection to country.

All meals are prepared using seasonal locally sourced Tasmanian produce, with wukalina Walk running from September to April. *wukalinawalk.com.au*

#### THREE CAPES LODGE WALK

The TASMAN PENINSULA has some of the world's most dramatic geology. Its sheer sea cliffs, which in places stand hundreds of feet above the breaking waves of the Tasman Sea, are the tallest in the Southern Hemisphere. Seeing these, on a four-day/three night Three Capes Lodge Walk with TASMANIAN WALKING COMPANY, will blow you away.

Setting off from Hobart you'll be transferred to **PORT ARTHUR** for a scenic boat cruise to Denmans Cove. From there, it's less than a three-mile hike to the first lodge where dinner preparations will be underway and there will be wine to drink and more views to admire. The final two nights are in **CAPE PILLAR LODGE**, complete with bathtubs and a massage therapist.

You won't need to carry more than a 20-pound daypack for this 30-mile guided walk in **TASMAN NATIONAL PARK**. The longest day of hiking is 11 miles but it's well worth the effort to be able to climb "the blade" at Cape Pillar. Keep an eye out for eagles and, on a still day, listen out for the seals on nearby Tasman Island barking as they splash around in rockpools. #### CRADLE MOUNTAIN HUTS WALK

When the first nine walkers set off on Tasmania's newly opened 40-mile **OVERLAND TRACK** in 1931, there was just a haphazard puzzle of rough hunting, mining and stock trails to follow. These days, Tasmania's iconic multi-day track is still not for the faint-hearted but on the Cradle Mountain Huts Walk, with TASMANIAN WALKING COMPANY, you'll be comfortably accommodated and well fed.

From Launceston you'll be transferred to CRADLE MOUNTAIN-LAKE ST CLAIR NATIONAL PARK, which is part of the Tasmanian Wilderness World Heritage Area. In the afternoon, after you've hauled yourself up the chain rope to an alpine plain above 3300 feet, you can celebrate that the steepest part of the trail is behind you.

Ahead are vast button grass plains where wombats love to wander, green rooms of ancient mossy cool-temperate rainforest, alpine lakes and icy waterfalls. Daily walking distances are up to 7.5-miles. There's an optional hike up 5300foot MT OSSA for breathtaking views on clear days. Trips run October through to May. taswalkingco.com.au

#### TARKINE RAINFOREST EXPERIENCE


This 1737-square-mile area was named after one of three Palawa groups, the Tarkiner, who freely inhabited it before colonization. The Tarkine contains one of the largest unbroken stands of cooltemperate rainforest in the Southern Hemisphere as well as eucalypt forest, tea tree forest, heathland, button grass plains and tannin-dark rivers.

TARKINE TRAILS will collect you from LAUNCESTON and deliver you within a mile of their standing camp, TIGER RIDGE (named in memory of Tasmania's extinct thylacine). From there you walk. For four days, hiking no more than a few miles each day, you'll explore the forest around you. You'll feel the sponginess of the leaf littered ground beneath your feet as you learn all about this precious ecosystem, 1200 years in the making.

At your rustic-yet-comfortable base of Tiger Ridge, there's a fireplace and a huge oak table in the longhouse to sit around and share stories, drink Tassie wine and enjoy freshly prepared meals. Safari-style tents are dotted throughout the surrounding forest. Once you hit the sheets, savor the Tarkine's night time soundtrack: total silence. *tarkinetrails.com.au*




#### FREYCINET EXPERIENCE WALK

This four-day guided walk, on the traditional land of the Oyster Bay nation, takes you to the HAZARDS and WINEGLASS **BAY** where the tourists flock, but also into the quiet backblocks of FREYCINET **PENINSULA** in Freycinet National Park.

There are two long walking days and two easy days. On the hardest day you have the choice of an 8.5-mile coastal hike or a more challenging 10-mile trek up **MT GRAHAM** for epic views of the peninsula's natural wonders. There will also be opportunities for fishing, swimming, bird spotting and animal viewing. If you're lucky, you'll see dolphins.

FRIENDLY BEACHES LODGE, only a few hundred feet back from a five-mile-long beach, will be your base for three nights. Called "the invisible lodge", this walkers' haven sits lightly in the environment, concealed until you're close by. The main dining table is made from reclaimed timber and the owner's art collection is displayed on the Tasmanian oak walls. freycinet.com.au 🔕

#### HIKING ESSENTIALS

#### What to pack

You'll receive a detailed equipment list before any guided hike in Tasmania, but here are some pointers to remember before you set off: CARRY A FULL RANGE OF LAYERS, from lightweight

tank tops to a good parka, no matter what time of year you visit. Tasmanian outdoors people call cotton "cold death" because if it gets wet it stays wet in cool and cold conditions. Stick to merino wool and quick-dry sports synthetics.

BRING YOUR SWIMSUIT and a travel towel for spontaneous swims, though don't be surprised if others - even guides – go skinny dipping (it's very Tasmanian). WEAR STURDY HIKING SHOES

#### **OR BOOTS** you're comfortable

in. Cut toenails short before the hike. Use sports tape to manage blisters.

CARRY A FILTERED WATER BOTTLE, such as a LifeStraw Go Bottle, to replenish your drinking water at lakes and streams.

BRING A DAYPACK suitable in size for your specific trip. A fanny pack won't be adequate for any of them. Fun fact: if you call something a "fanny pack", Tasmanians will blush or laugh as this has a very different meaning in Australia. You can, however, refer to your flipflops as "thongs" and nobody will bat an eyelid.



#### BEYOND THE CITY

The beautiful **HUON VALLEY** is just 30 minutes from Hobart and home to quaint villages, the HUON RIVER, and the soaring TAHUNE FOREST AIRWALK. It's also well known for its cideries and cool-climate winemakers - AGEING BARREL TOURS runs tours to the region between October and May to sample gourmet wines, ciders, gin, vodka and local cheeses. ageingbarrel.com.au

#### ULTIMATE ENTERTAINMENT OPTION

A local icon, the historic STATE CINEMA has been entertaining locals for a century. Australian and international films are shown across 11 screens, and during summer there's a rooftop cinema that plays blockbusters with views of the city and KUNANYI/MOUNT WELLINGTON. statecinema.com.au

#### ANOTHER GOOD WALK

The epic 8.8-mile Hobart to the Pinnacle walk climbs 3937 feet from HOBART RIVULET, through the city, behind the historic CASCADE BREWERY and into the bushland and fern-filled creek gullies of WELLINGTON PARK. You'll be rewarded with wildlife spottings and great views. greaterhobarttrails.com.au

## WELCOME to COUNTRY

he histories and cultures of Australia's First Nations peoples stretch back proud and unbroken through millennia, endowing the island continent with a rich legacy that Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples share generously with visitors.

Tracing their origins back some 65,000 years, Australia's First Nations peoples can lay claim to being the custodians of the oldest living civilization on Earth, one that has been shaped and informed by cultural practices that have remained largely unchanged through its long history. Experiencing the exquisite traditions and stories of the country's Indigenous peoples while visiting Australia will add a depth of understanding to your journey that no guidebook can bestow.

At the heart of First Nations culture is Country. Australia's Indigenous peoples have a profound spiritual, social and cultural connection to the land beneath them. According to the Australian Institute of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Studies (AIATSIS), "Country is the term often used by Aboriginal peoples to describe the lands, waterways and seas to which they are connected. The term contains complex ideas about law, place, custom, language, spiritual belief, cultural practice, material sustenance, family and identity." Protecting and nurturing Country is seen as a responsibility and privilege of custodianship.

First Nations cultures and histories are always best shared by their owners. The diversity, color and beauty of these cultures thrives through art, festivals, and singular experiences that are abundant and easily accessible. Whether spending time in the vast expanses of the outback or in one of Australia's thriving coastal capital cities, seeking out genuine connection with the country's First Nations peoples will inspire your imagination and reward your soul.

DARWIN ABORIGINAL ART FAIR Taking place on Larrakia Country each August, this is one of the country's premier Indigenous arts festivals, with over 70 Indigenous ownedand-operated Art Centers and some 2000 artists taking part. It is also a great way to buy art ethically, with 100 percent of sales going back to Art Center communities. daaf.com.au

### ROYAL BOTANIC GARDEN SYDNEY

Situated in the heart of Sydney, the gloriously verdant botanic garden is steeped in the ancient histories and culture of the traditional custodians of the land, which are brought to light and celebrated on a range of immersive tours, including the Aboriginal Bush Tucker Tour and Aboriginal Cultural Sunset Tour. rbgsyd.nsw.gov.au

The Aboriginal-owned-andoperated Mossman Gorge Centre, located in tropical far north Queensland, is the starting point for the Ngadiku Indigenous Guided Dreamtime Walk. Led by local guides, the tour begins with a traditional 'smoking' ceremony before heading off along private tracks through cool rainforests to visit culturally significant sites to the local Bama peoples. mossmangorge.com.au

WILPENA POUND RESORT Owned and operated by Adnyamathanha Traditional Owners, Wilpena Pound Resort, located within Ikara-Flinders Ranges National Park, a five-hour drive from Adelaide, offers Aboriginal cultural tours including the Sacred Canyon-Yura Mulka Cultural Walk, with local Adnyamathanha guides explaining the cultural significance of the canyon and its ancient rock engravings. wilpenapound.com.au



ou know, Lord Howe is considered the Galapagos of Australia." It's a bold claim, and one that is made often in the great southern land (see details of Maria Island on page 88 as proof), where the abundance and unique characteristics of its flora and fauna lend themselves to such grand statements. But given that Dave Gardiner, a 40-year veteran of the waters around Lord Howe Island and a typically laconic Australian character (read: not prone to hyperbole), is the one making it, having just spotted a pod of pilot whales bobbing and diving in the distance (at first he assumed they were dolphins, so plentiful are they in these parts), it's easy to give the claim credence.

As he steers his state-of-the-art eco vessel, *Reef N Beyond*, towards the imposing 1800-feet-tall form of BALL'S **PYRAMID**, a towering shard of rock jutting from the blue waters of the Tasman Sea, he reels off the names of the abundant birds that dart and wheel overhead. Killing the engine at the base of the basalt sea stack (the world's tallest), the remains of a giant volcano and caldera formed millions of years ago, Dave encourages everyone into the water in snorkeling gear to experience

more of Lord Howe Island's Galapagoschallenging wildlife: turtles, rainbow runners, violet sweeps.

#### ISLAND LIFE

Back on land, the dense, lush vegetation of kentia palms, banyan trees and ferns fringed by pristine white-sand beaches validate the other often used term to describe Lord Howe Island: paradise. The UNESCO World Heritage-listed island that sits 373 miles off the New South Wales coast from Sydney is a tropical idyll that is blissfully removed from the ordinary. Cars are used

sparingly, school children attend classes barefoot (shoes aren't part of the official uniform), and there are only 400 privileged visitors allowed on the island at any time.

The landscape of Lord Howe is dominated by the hulking form of MT **GOWER**, so complete is its presence from every corner of the island. Even on clear sky days, the summit plateau, located some 2870 feet above sea level, is often crowned by fluffy white clouds. It presents an irresistible obstacle that many visitors to the island are determined to surmount: the return hike to the top takes roughly eight hours

and can be rugged and challenging in parts, requiring the services of a qualified guide. This ends up being a bonus, as along the way you can gain an insight into the unique flora and fauna that proliferates. Alternatively, the walk to **muttonbird point** LOOKOUT, a brisk return hike of just under two miles from the turnoff to the island's modest airport, delivers views to a nesting colony of masked boobies and their downy brown offspring that presents like a Sir David Attenborough nature documentary.

There are less strenuous ways to encounter the island's wildlife at close quarters however. Bicycle is the preferred mode of transport here (be prepared to steer one handed as you continuously wave a cheery hello to everyone you pass), allowing ample opportunity to stop to observe a roll call of birds that busy themselves rooting around in the thick, moist ground cover; the Lord Howe woodhen, the lovely emerald ground dove, and the Pacific golden plover.

Meanwhile, at NED'S BEACH on the north-east of the island, the likes of mullet, garfish and kingfish gather around your ankles in search of food when you wade into the clear waters; nutritionally beneficial fish pellets

are dispensed in perfect piscine portions from a nearby box.

#### QUIET LUXURY

Given the luxury of experience offered up on Lord Howe, it's perhaps not surprising that there is a decidedly luxe feel to its accommodation options too.

CAPELLA LODGE, part of the bespoke Baillie Lodges roster that includes Longitude 131° in Uluru, is a sophisticated boutique hotel nestled in the shadows of Mt Gower. Here the emphasis is on streamlined luxury, all the better to experience the island and its simple pleasures without unnecessary fuss or visual noise. Everything here is considered and executed impeccably,

from the subtle yet stylish decor to the delicious food to the relaxed but highly efficient service. And the plunge pool looking out to uninterrupted views is the ultimate Instagram capture.

At Old Settlement Beach, ARAJILLA **RETREAT** takes an equally relaxed approach to luxury. Shrouded in lush vegetation, the central open-air lodge forms the heart of the property, a place to gather, eat and relax, while its stylish suites are reached via raised walkways.

The delightful Chef's Cottage at **PINETREES** comes complete with bookshelves lined with beach reads, three bedrooms and a full kitchen so you can indulge in the fantasy of it being your own self-contained holiday house in the Galapagos of Australia.



#### **BE AN ECO WARRIOR**

Protecting Lord Howe Island's unique eco-system and enviable way of life is a full time pursuit for many on the island, one that visitors can take part in too. As part of the Australian Geographic Expedition, to be held in September 2022, visitors will work with Australian Geographic and the Lord Howe Island Board to survey birdlife, marine life with NSW Marine Parks, and possibly do an invertebrate survey as well (pinetrees.com.au/rates-packages/ australian-geographic-expedition). Keen twitchers should book their visit to coincide with Bird Week in March in order to take part in organized birdwatching tours with naturalist lan Hutton (lordhowe-tours.com.au). Participants count and categorize the birds they view, with details added to a central register back on the Australian mainland.



#### BEYOND THE CITY

THE BLUE MOUNTAINS, located an hour west of the city, is an easy day tour or weekend stay option full of stunning scenery, nature walks, and quaint villages. Visit in summer for the temperate climate or during winter to feel the chill nipping at your nose. For the ultimate stay, book into **EMIRATES** ONE&ONLY WOLGAN VALLEY, a luxury lodge in pristine surroundings. oneandonlyresorts.com/wolgan-valley

#### ULTIMATE ENTERTAINMENT OPTION

Each year in March and April, Opera Australia decamps to a huge floating stage for HANDA OPERA ON SYDNEY HARBOUR, an outdoor performance which culminates in a fireworks spectacular with the Bridge and Opera House in the background. opera.org.au

#### ANOTHER GOOD WALK

Lycra-clad locals flock to the BONDI to BRONTE walk, which snakes along the headlands between the two beachside suburbs, providing stunning views all the way. Visit during SCULPTURE BY THE SEA when the route becomes an outdoor exhibition space for 100 sculptures by Australian and international artists. sculpturebythesea.com/bondi
